Plein air painting hardly seems like a radical artistic movement today, but in the early 1800s its origins were quite revolutionary. Until then, artists had to mix their own paint colors from scratch, a process so inconvenient it kept most captive in their studios. The new availability of pre-mixed tubes of paint quite literally opened the door to the magic of painting in natural light, finding the shades, colors, and nuance only possible to capture in the brilliance of open air.

Bring your paints outdoors! With 16 hours of ever-changing daylight, summer's nocturnal light shows, sparkling water, and every shade of wildflower and meadow grass imaginable, our bay area is a lush and lovely location to discover or hone your plein air aspirations. Featuring outdoor demonstrations and open painting sessions in various landscapes, the four days will culminate in a final celebration of artists, with the chance to view, discuss,



and enjoy time together. Focus will be on oil, watercolor, and pastel techniques, as well as sharing time and insights with like-minded artists and friends. Make plans to join us at the **Washburn Cultural Center** in Washburn, Wisc. No matter what the weather, this is certain to be a beautiful breath of fresh air, and the perfect beginning to Summer of 2022.

We'll be kicking off the summer as we collaborate with the **Washburn Cultural Center** on an inaugural plein air event. Dubbed **"PAW (Plein Air Washburn),"**it will be held June 8-11 with demos in three media. Opportunities to explore the area culminate in an informal display of the work created. Chequamegon Bay Arts Council is proud to award \$15,550 in 2022 Arts Initiative grants, which fund project-based activities such as public exhibitions, performances, publications, touring productions, commissioned art, and educational activities. Artistic disciplines include dance, theater, music, folk arts, literary arts, video, film and visual arts.

"Anishinaabe Dibaajimowin: An Ojibwe Story," \$3,000. Free school shows for students in Ashland and Bayfield counties of the original theater piece, "Anishinaabe Dibaajimowin: An Ojibwe Story."

Profile Artist/Teacher By Kristin Tetzner

"When the hands are busy, the mind falls open." I really enjoy this quote that street artist **MOR** shared during her artist showcase at this year's **National Art Education Association (NAEA)** national convention in NYC. It illustrates the idea that creating opens a door to a different sort of thinking and doing, which is a pretty magical thing. I am fortunate enough to bear witness to this daily in my role as an art educator.

Path to teaching art

I have had students ask me how I knew I wanted to be an art teacher. I reply by telling them that at first, I didn't. I have always loved and felt successful at making art, thanks to the many people in my life who have encouraged me and made me feel that I have skill worth pursuing. Teaching art wasn't something I initially considered, and I came to be an art teacher after getting my undergraduate degree through a roundabout series of experiences and choices.

I entered college as a pre-veterinary medicine student (I also really loved and excelled at science and math), but soon realized I was missing being connected to art in some way. I ended up transferring schools and changing majors and found myself at UW-Superior with an amazing group of art department professors. I took my first traditional photography course there and had a professor who nudged me in the direction of studio art as a major. I eventually graduated from **UW-Superior** with a BFA degree (traditional photography emphasis).

Following experiences as a fine arts camp counselor, freelance photographer, graphic designer/illustrator and substitute teacher, I decided to obtain my teaching certification in art. I was lucky to complete my student teaching with two amazing area teachers:




Joni Chapman in Ashland and Kelly Randolph in Drummond (who had been my teacher K-12). I accepted my first teaching position that very same spring as middle school/high school art teacher in Boyceville, Wisc.

Art education in Washburn

Fifteen years of teaching have gone by in the blink of an eye—13 of which have been spent in Washburn working primarily with grades 7-12 and coaching the Visual Arts Classic team (an extracurricular art and design problem-solving team). My job as an art educator today is different in many ways than when I began. Meeting the changing needs of students has required that more time and energy be invested in supports that extend beyond the content curriculum.

I am proud to be able to offer a wide range of art experiences to Washburn students as elective courses in our small school setting. I teach quarter-long exploratory art classes for seventh and eighth grade students as well as semester-long high school classes in Foundations of Visual Art and Design, 2D Art, 3D Art, Printmaking, Photography (digital and darkroom), Design, Digital Media Art, and Art Studio. Giving students a range of choices when it comes to art electives allows them to pursue a more specific interest or strength they have.

Developing and updating curriculum is an important component of what I do, aligned with the Wisconsin Standards for Art & Design: Create, Present, Respond, Connect. My goals in this process include providing scaffolding of skills and experiences, exposure to a variety of materials, tools, techniques, art and artists, familiarity with the elements and principles of design, and utilization of the "Artist Habits of Mind."

In recent years, technology has been used increasingly as a tool to create art, and I introduced the Digital Media course to allow students to explore digital art, animation, and 3D modeling in greater depth. All middle and high school students create an online portfolio of their work using **Artsonia,** which also allows for public display online with parent permission. Our middle and high school gallery can be viewed here: <u>https://www. artsonia.com/schools/school.</u> asp?id=99195.

Unlearn to learn

As an art educator, my role sometimes is to help students unlearn things. A challenge I find common in teaching art to young people is the task of helping them move beyond the fears or misconceptions they have about making art. The fear of not doing something "right" or the possibility of "failing" can be a barrier to trying new things or thinking outside the box. Students often think that everything they create needs to be a masterpiece rather than thinking of individual works as steppingstones and practice.

In response to this mindset, one of my undertakings in recent years has been to update and re-format my assessments to ensure that students are being rewarded for taking creative risks, even if those risks don't end up panning out as planned. Challenging oneself, making mistakes, re-evaluating, and trying again is an important part of the learning process (and life!). There is a quote on display in my classroom by

Seth Godin that reads: "If you are willing to do something that might not work, you are closer to becoming an artist."

One of my greatest joys as an art teacher is seeing a student feel pride in something they have done. Sometimes it is overcoming an obstacle or showing perseverance through a tough process. Other times they are trying something for the first time and are surprised at how well they do. When students feel good about achieving something, the process becomes fun, and they truly get hooked on learning and creating. I love that students enjoy coming to my classroom and are motivated to learn and explore.

It is no secret that educators today face increasing demands and challenges and need all the support they can get. I feel very fortunate to live and work in a community so dedicated to the arts, and the Chequamegon Bay Arts Council is very instrumental in that. Last year I benefited from an artistic development grant and have been using what I learned to enrich my photography curriculum as well as jumpstart some of my own personal projects.

Almost every year I have one or two students who plan to pursue visual art after high school, and some have received the CBAC scholarship to help them further their studies. Former students have been accepted to visual arts programs at **MCAD**, **UW-Stout**, **UW-Eau Claire** and **UW-Milwaukee**, to name a few. Whatever path students choose, it is my hope that the art experiences they have had provide them with the tools for communication, problem-solving, perseverance and a better understanding of the world around them.
