## **2025 Recipients** of Arts Initiative Grants

The Chequamegon Bay Arts Council has selected eight recipients for the 2025 Arts Initiative grants. This year CBAC received 15 applications asking to fund \$36,000 worth of projects. All of them were worthy of being funded, but, unfortunately, our available funding amounted to a total of \$15,000. CBAC receives an annual grant from the Wisconsin Arts Board as part of its regranting program. This year, the WAB grant was \$8,700. Through fundraising, we match that WAB grant. The combined funds make our grants program possible.

Many thanks to the four panelists who evaluated all of the applications: Claire Duquette, former newspaper editor; Carla Bremner, board member of the Washburn Cultural Center; Neil Paynter, musician; and Kathy Gilmore, watercolor artist and grant writer. All spent many hours reading the grant applications and making difficult decisions. The CBAC board reviewed the panel's recommendation and approved it at their meeting on February 10.

### Congratulations, 2025 Arts **Initiative Grant Recipients!**

- Big Water Film Festival (\$2,000)-To continue film festival at Bay Theater including honoraria to filmmakers who participate in discussion during the festival.
- City of Ashland (\$2,500)–"Bridging Gaps": Creation of a mural about transportation, humans, and Lake Superior, including classes on mosaic making open to the public.
- **CORE** (\$1,440)–"Art Making for Seniors, Empowerment Through Creativity," a series of workshops for seniors led by artists to encourage artistic expression.
- Herbster Studio Art Tour (\$2,500)-To fund artists, school district teachers, and dancers involved in the tour.
- Iron River Lions Club (\$2,500)-"Discover Iron River" mural: Production and painting of historic mural on Route 2 in Iron River.
- La Pointe Center for the Arts (\$1,000)–"Outdoor Summer Concert Series": To fund payment of musicians, sound engineers and staff of the summer concert series.
- Monday Night Life Drawing Group (\$1,856)—"To fund payment of models, rent, and facilitator
- Washburn Forward Together (\$1,204)—"for "Love Stories for the Lake Front," an arts event to take place in Washburn in July 2025 including music, art making, art show, and reception.

CBAC has also experienced some change. The board voted, and the motion was passed by our members at the annual meeting, to elect **Dorota Bussey** as co-president. Dorota has been a board member since 2021, is an accomplished artist, and has been instrumental in the success of our spring and fall art shows. I'm so happy to have her joining me in this role!

At CBAC we know that growth requires new ideas and people with all kinds of skills. In 2025 we will be looking for new board members who can help us continue to grow and meet the needs of our area. ## An Artist's Life

### Paula Bunch 1943-2021 A tribute by her daughter and fellow artist Lesley Bunch

Paula Bunch, my mother, was a painter, photographer, printmaker, teacher, gallerist, and lifelong supporter of other artists. She was always making something. When I think of her, I remember her curiosity, devotion, continual study, probing thought, and her boundless creativity; not just to her work, but to everything she did. My sister **Shelley** and I have wonderful memories of our childhood, growing up in the countryside just outside of Madison. Mom was always there for us, often with brush in hand, encouraging us to join her in all things creative.

Mom's childhood was difficult. Although she was adopted at birth she was later taken into care in a children's home in Chicago at the age of 5. She wasn't re-adopted until the age of 12, by my wonderful grandparents Carol and Bill. They turned her life around. She always wanted to know who her biological parents were, and although she found her mother, who became very dear to her, she never found her father. After she died I carried on the search to help process the grief of losing her. I found my grandfather, but sadly it

was too late for her to know who he was. When I look back, I can sense her questioning of identity, in varying degrees, in much of the work she produced. Of late, I've realized that this has been a driving force in much of my own work, too.

"The theme, the figure, has always challenged one's abilities as a painter. But more specifically, I have chosen to depersonalize the figure and remove its relationship to reality. In the 1960s Wayne Thiebald was fascinated with 'the human figure-as-object.' My figures exist in a non-environment, a spatial void of color and line. You might call this surreal, since they exist in neither specific time nor space." —Paula Bunch 1985

The last series of paintings she did was a return to portraiture, all left ambiguous, ghostlike, with no defining facial features. My favorite at lower left, although untitled, I believe to be a self-portrait. It is saturated with color. It is as vibrant as she was, but masked, seemingly wrapped, with identity hidden. For me, it is an incredibly moving last gasp in her state of unknowing, and remaining unaware of, who her father was.

Mom gained her B.S. in Art Education at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. She went on to teach for many years at the Oconomowoc Board of Education, Cleveland Museum of Art and Board of Education, and the University of Wisconsin Elvehiem Art Center. As well as a number of solo shows in Madison, she participated in many group shows-at the Straub Art Center, Wisconsin Memorial Union, Madison Bank and Trust Company, Madison Art Center, **Wisconsin Academy of Sciences** Arts and Letters, Gallery B106 The Depot, Edgewood College, Milwaukee Museum of Art, the **Dubuque Fine Arts Society, Seuferer-**Chosy Gallery, and the Wisconsin Biennial, among others.

She was always experimenting. Early figurative work turned to abstraction. She engaged with painting, ceramics, analogue and digital photography, and printmaking.

Some of my most enduring memories are the from the back seat of the car, listening to mom and dad, **Mike Bunch**, excitedly converse on just about every topic I can think of. Dad became involved in mom's art early on, attending openings, framing, delivering, installing. He was an engineer, but fully engaged in everything mom did, and on top of that an inventor, designer, and blacksmith among other things.

Mom started making monotypes during her M.F.A. at UW-Madison in the early 90s. In support, dad designed for her, and built, an intaglio press. When her fellow students and

staff found out, they wanted one, too, and dad's sideline business, **Bunch Presses,** was born.

Bunch presses are scattered around the U.S., having been built for artist friends including **John** Mominee, Wayne Talyor, Fran Myers, Warrington Colescott, Bill Weege, Sally DuBack, and Barbara Manger, and many more. The highlight for dad was building one of the largest presses in the U.S., a 72" x 144" motorized Bunch press for Tandem **Press.** It is still in use. "A legendary and integral part of our history," says Tandem Press, and central to their printmaking operation. When mom passed away, dad donated her press to Northland College in Ashland.

After her M.F.A, mom turned her thoughts, and her work to environmental concerns.

"Enjoyment of nature is a starting point for my 'painterly prints' or monotypes. Walking Lake Superior shores, I've found much to catch my eye: Feathers dropped by summer birds, imprints left in sand, debris, and unique vegetation are a brimming visual text. These are restated in a personal iconography less realistic. Images, resisting the known, established convention create another perspective for the mind's eye." —Paula Bunch


Both mom and dad were members of the **Badger History Group** and the **Sauk Prairie Conservation Alliance,** which was conceived of in dad's **Bunch Engineering** office and mom's **Water Street Gallery.** It was in Prairie du Sac with local friends, including the renowned writer and conservation

biologist **Curt Meine**, that they started their long involvement with the decommissioning and clean up of the **Badger Ammunition Plant.** 

Mom spent years photographing the vast site before demolition, documenting nature's own attempt to reclaim the site, and the detritus of toxic manufacturing. They, and others in the group, were crucial players in the transfer of part of the site to the **Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources.** 

One of mom's Badger Ammunition Plant photos was exhibited in Cuba in 2002, in a show based around environmental themes. Every time she went anywhere, even the local supermarket, mum engaged in conversation and generally in the space of ten minutes had the basics of a stranger's life story. This was certainly the case in Cuba, when she befriended her guide, and made a body of work in response to their conversations about life in Cuba.

"In June of 2002, I was one of 35 artists who visited Havana with a collection of works on environmental themes. During this short visit of 8 days, I photographed. This present exhibition, 'Havana: A Portrait of Conscience' grew out of this time. My hope in this visual essay is to express my deep

attraction for this remarkable island and its inhabitants. Historically the Cuban people are a resilient population and reflect a diversity of culture and religion. One Cuban man I met left a lasting impression. He shared his concerns about his life in Cuba. Mainly, because of his candid friendship, I decided to share his words and my experience."—Paula Bunch 2003

Environmental concerns continued to play a significant role in mom's work after my parents moved to the Chequamegon Bay area from Prairie du Sac. Her untitled painting (at top, next page) from this period is evocative of light falling to the forest floor, and she photographed Lake Superior and the Onion River continually. Mom and her friend **Sally Bowker** joined forces to exhibit their photographs at the **Washburn Cultural Center** in 2015 in an exhibition "Collaborations with Nature"–Sally Bowker with her series "The Space Between: Meditations on a Plum Thicket" and mom with "A River Runs Through It: Water Series."

Mom's themes were not restricted to environmental concerns. For me, one of her most memorable series of photographs was a "Matter of Silence," her response to the horrors of war.



"I chose the title for this photo essay, 'A Matter of Silence' because so many of the concerns dealt with in this exhibition seem to be urgent, but the general public voice is subdued. These images pose questions that are not easily answered. So I present these images to promote dialogue and reflection—a vision where answers are yet unknown, but totally in the realm of our collective future."—Paula Bunch

Included in her statement for "A Matter of Silence" is a poem titled <u>"Keeping Quiet"</u> by one of mom's favorite poets, **Pablo Neruda.** For me, it also sums up mom's manner of leaving, which, wasn't really leaving.

Although mom passed away three years ago, she is in my thoughts every day, painting alongside me. I'm lucky to have her paint splattered easel and apron, and many of her books. When I read them, things fall out: her notes, her sketches, her favorite poems. We continue our conversations, and debate.

## Arts Worth Lobbying For!

Bay area artists and art supporters attending the Chequamegon Bay Arts Council annual meeting on January 27 were assured that the arts continue to be a vital part of the regional economy and increasingly contribute to the quality of life for those living in the area.

In attendance were **Anne Katz** of the **Create Wisconsin** nonprofit arts advocacy organization and **George Tzougros** and **Karen Goeschko** of the **Wisconsin Arts Board.** Both arts leaders said the arts in Wisconsin continue to grow and be an important part of the state landscape, and encouraged attendees to advocate for public spending in the arts.

Tzougros pointed out the Arts Board and CBAC have had a steady relationship over the years, as CBAC receives matching grants from the Arts Board that are used in the community. Tzougros explained the Arts Board is comprised of 15 governor-appointed members and has always had a northern Wisconsin representative.

Anne Katz said she expects **Governor Tony Evers**' proposed budget to have a boost in arts funding, and encouraged everyone to lobby their legislative representatives to support arts spending, a proven economic driver. She noted Wisconsin currently ranks 49 out of 50 in per capita arts spending, a distressing statistic. She also said there are proposals to once again offer incentives to the film industry, a program once used, but cut, in Wisconsin, and encouraged support for recreating a film office. Speaking to the impact of local arts spending, CBAC Copresident **LeeAnn Frey** said CBAC gave out about \$20,000 in grants in 2024 to ten area arts organizations and individuals and \$4,000 in scholarships to two high school students studying art.

The groups receiving grants in 2024 included the Bayfield Summer Concert Series; Marlin Ledin for CD production; the Port Wing Plein Air Festival; Rabbit, Bird & Bear Gallery to bring the traveling exhibit "Waiting for Beds"; Devin Thunhorst for community music events; and Lost in the Woods Improv Group. Individuals receiving artistic development grants included watercolorist June Bavlnka, writer Colene Lee, ceramic artist Sarah Jo Messer, and fiber artist Shae Schachameyer.

**Jim Peacock** told the group that the CBAC grant allowed Rabbit, Bird & Bear to bring the traveling exhibit "Waiting for Beds" to the Bayfield gallery in April 2024, where about 200 community members could experience the exhibit, which focused on using art to illuminate the shortage of services and housing for those in crisis.

**June Bavlnka** received an artistic development grant she used to help fund participation in a watercolor workshop with master watercolorist **France Austin Miller.** 

"I want to thank CBAC for helping make a dream come true," she told the group. Bavlnka praised Austin Miller as an excellent teacher and displayed several of the paintings she created during the workshop.

CBAC's Frey noted CBAC is currently taking applications for the 2025 grant cycle. She also noted that CBAC plans two art shows at the Washburn Cultural Center—one in March open to all artists and a members-only show in October.

She noted in 2024, regional artists sold over \$5,000 in art at the two shows.  $\bigodot$

## Grant Reports

### 2024 Artistic Development Grant New Techniques—and Play

Thank you for the 2024 Artistic Development Grant of \$585, which allowed me to participate in three opportunites: 1) a week-long artist residency at the Grand Marais Art Colony; 2) Tara Faughnan's Color Interaction class and Block Studies Collective cohort; and 3) Quilt Folk's "Break the Rules" Block of the Month cohort. The two cohorts met monthly throughout 2024.

These experiences provided a structure to explore new techniques but also ignited creativity. The thread that ran through it all was fostering the space to just play. To not be stifled by the pressure to create a finished piece or even something that you liked. Instead, each of the experiences prompted exploration of color, play, and building a practice of experimentation. Additionally, continuing to learn more about color theory has had real impacts on my body of work this year, and I've had no shortage of inspiration which I can attribute to these experiences as well.

These experiences solidified my regular practice of creativity and art making. I hope to do an artist residency as a creative start to every new year.



#### 2024 Artistic Development Grant The Agony and the Ecstacy By Colene Lee

Writing memoir can be both agonizing and exhilarating. One of my memoir teachers recommends her students get themselves good therapists before commencing. I was glad I took her advice. I would never have written this book if I hadn't felt it might help others who have also experienced childhood sexual abuse. Silence is deadly. It can lead you to feel ashamed and alone. While statistics vary, all are extremely high, with one set reporting as many as one in every four girls and one in every six boys being sexually abused each year in the U.S.

Thank you for the generous CBAC Artistic Development Grant of \$1,650 for a developmental editor. It has allowed me, not only to greatly enhance my story telling and writing skills, but it has further incentivized me to help families, children, and adults dealing with child sexual abuse. The more I learn about its causes, frequency, symptoms, and adverse health effects—both mental and physical—the better I can write about them. The better I can write about them, the more I can help others.

#### 2024 Artistic Development Grant Plein Air Painting in Tuscany By June Bavlnka

I'd like to thank CBAC for the \$1,400 Artistic Development grant towards my attending a watercolor workshop in Tuscany, Italy with internationally known artist France Austin Miller of Bayfield. Her artistic style and its evolution over the decades have always intrigued me.

The workshop was set in the small community of Subbiano in Tuscany. We stayed at Villa Vigna, which is set on a hillside with acres of grapevines wandering up the slopes. Upon arrival, we had time to get acquainted with the grounds and our designated painting area.

Right away, I identified two goals for my personal painting growth. One was to paint the clear demijohn jugs formerly used to transport wine. The second was to paint the hillside depicting the rise and contour of the land as well as the distance when painting the background hillside.

Our lessons started the very next day with specific skill challenges and tonal color variations. Other lessons punctuated the use of shadow to enhance the

contrast of light and dark. I practiced this technique on both plein air and reference paintings. After the workshop, I now examine all of my paintings to see where I can enhance the overall appearance, using more distinct shadowing and light to dark transitions.

I also discovered new techniques in using "paint-pours" as background for negative image painting.

A totally new technique for me was the use of gouache and India ink to create black and white paintings. First, the selected image is painted with white gouache onto white paper, which requires one to be very aware of the image and the negative areas. When that is totally dry, black India ink is brushed over the entire image and allowed 24 hours to dry completely. Then, the watercolor sheet with both the gouache and the ink are taken to a sink to be washed. As you wipe off the gouache, the ink stays, revealing a negative painting. After that process is complete, you can add watercolor to the image.

One of the most valuable aspects of the experience of painting with others on a daily basis was the regular critique of our work. It is valuable lesson to have other eyes on your work as well as stepping back and looking at your own work from a distance or after a lapse of time.

This journey of new painting experiences in an incredibly inspiring landscape has added depth to my watercolor work and provided me with direct instruction, encouragement, and critique.

I look forward to incorporating these techniques and critique suggestions into my ongoing watercolor adventures.

monthly event, to showcase traditional folk dance with a live band at various locations across the South Shore in Bayfield County. The first one was in the town hall in Cornucopia, and the second was at Herbster Gym. The grant helped employ musicians and callers for the events, which brought together community members of all ages, musicians, dance callers, and dance enthusiasts from the entire region. This project endeavored to foster community through dance and hopes to continue this tradition for years to come.
